Pando Populus is connecting change makers to create a more ecologically balanced future. We focus on ecology, social justice, and the big ideas that unite and underlie them. Our inaugural event in June of 2015 brought together 1,500 people from around the globe to rethink civilization in explicitly ecological terms. John B. Cobb, Jr., pioneer at the intersection of philosophical theology and the environment, served as intellectual architect. Since then, we've put shovels in the ground for an eco-homeless shelter. Developed community gardening and urban farming initiatives in the cities of Carson and Ontario. Helped launch a field-based education program related to the region's great watersheds. Brought LA County's architecture and design schools together to take on SoCal waste. And deepened interfaith collaboration for the Earth. In 2017, we launched the Chief Sustainability Officer (CSO) Strategic Taskforce for LA County, in collaboration with Los Angeles City Councilmember Paul Koretz and Caltech CSO John Onderdonk. We're currently deepening our collaboration with Maryknoll Monrovia to incarnate Pope Francis's vision of integral ecology. In all these initiatives, we create capacity for our partners and help them accomplish work together that is difficult to pull off alone. Think old-fashioned barn-raising, with an urban and eco twist. We are named for the largest organism on Earth: Pando, a 106-acre one-tree forest in south central Utah that grows from a single root. It is a profound symbol of interconnection.

Presenters (in speaking order) and Facilitators

Joy Esmenda is Coordinator for the Maryknoll Sisters in Monrovia. Sr. Joy worked in the design and architecture field for four years prior to entering the Sisters. Her mission work in Bolivia was spent in Santa Cruz and Cochabamba, where she worked in a variety of positions – from children and youth ministries and women’s leadership to pastoral outreach for frontline communities, including indigenous Quechua communities and communities of garbage collectors. Among the projects she organized and helped create was a farming initiative using sustainable and traditional methods.

Eugene Shirley is founding president of Pando Populus. Eugene spent most of his career as an entrepreneur across the spectrum of media initiatives motivated by big ideas, first in print, then for 25 years in independent documentary film production, then in text analytics. He focused on human rights issues early in his career, becoming the first U.S. independent filmmaker to film officially in the former Soviet Union; the resulting film premiered at the White House on International Human Rights Day and showed in 25 countries. His four-part series on Soviet foreign policy for PBS and BBC was nominated for a BAFTA Award for best documentary series. His last film was about modernity and tradition in China as seen through the eyes and work of architect I.M. Pei; it showed in the U.S. as part of the PBS American Masters series, as well as internationally. For nearly a decade, he served as founding CEO of the text analytics firm, Alexandria Technology, focused on the instantaneous understanding of text and the analysis of its sentiment. In 2014, he co-founded Pando Populus with John Cobb, John Bielenberg, and others. For two years, he was a Jennings Randolph Fellow at the United States Institute of Peace.

John B. Cobb, Jr. is founding chair of Pando Populus. John is a leading philosophical theologian and is often regarded as the preeminent scholar in the field of process philosophy and process theology—the school of thought associated with the philosophy of Alfred North Whitehead. He is a founding pioneer at the intersection of philosophy, theology, and the environment. In 1971, he authored the seminal book, *Is It Too Late?*, focusing on the environmental crisis. In 1989, he co-authored the book *For the Common Good: Redirecting the Economy Toward Community, Environment, and a Sustainable Future*, which critiqued current global economic practice and advocated for a sustainable, ecology-based economics. In 2015, he co-edited the first volume of commentaries to appear on *Laudato Si'*.

A unifying theme of John’s work is his emphasis on ecological interdependence—the idea that every part of the ecosystem is reliant on all the other parts. He has argued that humanity’s most urgent task is to preserve the world on which it lives and depends, an idea which Alfred North Whitehead described as “world-loyalty.”

John is well known for his transdisciplinary approach, integrating insights from many different areas of study and bringing different specialized disciplines into fruitful communication. Because of his broad-minded interest and approach, Cobb has been influential in a wide range of disciplines, including theology, ecology, economics, biology, and social ethics.

John has written extensively on religious pluralism and interfaith dialogue, particularly between Buddhism and Christianity, as well as the need to reconcile religion and science. The author of more than fifty books, he is a Member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences.

John Bielenberg is founding creative director of Pando Populus. Designer, entrepreneur and imaginative advocate for a better world, John is recognized for innovative investigations into the practice and understanding of design and leadership in the “design for good” movement. He is an AIGA Medalist for Lifetime Achievement (2013). John co-founded Future Partners, a Silicon Valley Innovation firm, in 2012 to teach Think Wrong Practices to individuals, teams, and organizations around the world. In 2003, he created Project M, an immersive program designed to inspire and educate young designers, writers, photographers and filmmakers that their work can have significant positive impact on communities. With Alex Bogusky, he founded COMMON, a community for change. At the California College of the Arts in San Francisco, he launched Secret Project, a new Center for Thinking Wrong, and has most recently created the Think Wrong Institute at the University of Kansas. John has won more than 250 design awards. The San Francisco Museum of Modern Art has acquired six of his design projects and staged a solo exhibition of his work. He holds an honorary doctorate degree from Maryland Institute College of Art.

Bill Vitek is Professor of Philosophy and Chair of the Department of Humanities and Social Sciences at Clarkson University in Potsdam, New York. With Wes Jackson, Bill co-edited *Rooted in the Land* and *The Virtues of Ignorance*. Bill is working on a book of his own inspired by his philosophical-agricultural collaboration with Jackson titled *The Perennial Imagination: Hardwired for Eternity*. He is a founding project team-member of The Land Institute’s Ecosphere Studies program and directs the New Perennials Project, housed at The Rockefeller Family Fund.

Erin George is a Principal within the P & M Religious Institutes Services Group. In her role, she is responsible for leading the firm’s initiatives related to serving religious institutes. She has assisted numerous communities on a variety of projects including strategic and financial planning, organizational analyses, and operational reviews. She has a particular interest in promoting member well-being and in how services are provided to older members. She was the chief financial officer of the largest Area Agency on Aging in Michigan, focused on providing home and community based services to older adults. She was also the Executive Director of a family violence agency.

Our story begins in 1853 with four young women who journeyed from Regensburg, Germany to Brooklyn, New York to teach the children of German immigrants.

As members of the Worldwide Order of Preachers, the Sisters live according to the Four Pillars of Dominican Tradition: Prayer, Ministry, Community and Study. The Four Pillars are a daily witness to the Gospel of Jesus Christ. As daughters of St. Dominic, the Sisters live among God's people sharing hope and joy as Dominic did in the thirteenth century, striving to live in a way that calls others to know, love and follow our brother Jesus.

Today there are approximately 360 members serving primarily in and around Long Island and Brooklyn, NY. In addition, there are approximately 20 sisters ministering in Puerto Rico.

Beginning in 1859 in Allegany, NY, approximately one hour from Buffalo, the Allegany Franciscans began schools, hospitals, and foreign missions (Jamaica16, Bolivia2, and Brazil47). There are approximately 140 sisters and members currently minister in 5 states, with a significant presence in New York and New Jersey. There are approximately 47 sisters ministering in Brazil, 16 in Jamaica, and 2 in Bolivia. The Community has an active relationship with St. Bonaventure University, Allegany, NY.

We witness to God's Love in the Franciscan tradition by living as sisters with all creation and by joyfully serving others, especially those who are poor or marginalized.

There are approximately 80 sisters located in the United States; the international congregation also ministers in Brazil, England, Germany, India, Kenya, Mexico, Netherlands and Nigeria. In 1901, the Community moved to an area 30 miles north of Pittsburgh and became known as the Sisters of St. Joseph of Baden. There are approximately 165 sisters today. We commit ourselves, our energies and our resources to serving God and the 'dear neighbor' without distinction. We believe that God is alive in our world, in the people whom we serve, and the people for whom we pray. While we continue to respond to the critical needs of these times, we are filled with hope for the future.
